World Book Fair

New Delhi: The World Book Fair has been held for the past 44 years by the India Trade Promotion Organization (ITPO), under the Ministry of Commerce, and more importantly, the Government of India is the co-organizer of the fair

What makes this an exciting event for book lovers is that nearly 800 publishers from across the country and abroad participate in the World Book Fair, making it a grand celebration of books and writers.

The New Delhi World Book Fair 2017 was based on the theme 'Manushi - Books Written on Women and by Women'

Scheduled to be held between 7 to 15 January, 2017 at Pragati Maidan, New Delhi, the fair was inaugurated by The Union HRD Minister Shri Prakash Javadekar on 7 January 2017

Japan was the Guest of Honour Country at the New Delhi World Book Fair 2017. The endeavour was supported by the National Arts Council (NAC) and the Media Development Authority (MDA) to gave recognition to the authors, publishers, illustrators and other key players who are a part of Japan's publishing industry. It featured the authors who wrote in languages like English and Japanese; illustrators of graphic novels and children's picture books; and publishers of poetry, fiction, non-fiction and academic books.

350th Birth Anniversary of Guru Gobind Sahib

Patna: With huge glittering tents over the iconic Gandhi Maidan, lakhs of people, and lavish hospitality, Patna celebrated the 350th birth anniversary of Guru Gobind Sahib, the 10th Guru of the Sikhs. The seven-day *Prakash-Parv*, for which preparations had been on for two years and cost the government Rs 200 crore - had gathered praise not only from the locals but the Sikh community from across the world. Patna is the birthplace of Guru Gobind Singh, the 10th Sikh Guru. Built on his birthplace, the Sri Harmandir Sahib Gurudwara, is one of the holiest Sikh shrines. But the 17th Century Gurdwara, being located at a congested area of Patna the government picked the 61-acre Gandhi Maidan to host the lavish ceremonies.

Three tent cities were built with all facilities and makeshift gurudwaras were constructed. For a whole week, three *langars* - free dining arrangements -- were choc-a-bloc, feeding the 3 lakh pilgrims who came from across the world. On the fourth day of the celebrations, a "*pizza baba*" baked and distributed 1.25 lakh pizzas to people.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi visited Patna to offer prayers at the Gandhi Maidan and served "langar" to the people. In his address, he said, "Guru Gobind Singhji has inspired mankind 350 years ago, the world should know it... He put knowledge at the core of his teachings and inspired so many people through his thoughts and ideals".

Chief Minister Nitish Kumar participated by regularly conducting surveys and interacting with the officials involved. Officials said he had looked into all details, including gifts for the visiting dignitaries.

The Sikh community in particular and the khalsas in general would remain grateful for the hospitality," said Punjab Chief Minister Parkash Singh Badal, who also visited Gandhi Maidan on 5th january and released a special postage stamp on the occasion.

A habitat for INNOVATION

The college has allocated significant fund for various innovative research projects and thus providing students, the platform where they can explore their skill and work efficiently with the teachers. Presently, there are 18 ongoing research projects in the college.

The innovation project 311 entitled "Biochemical evaluation of sprouted fenugreek seeds for nutraceutical management of type- 2 diabetes using vitro assays" headed by Dr. Sadhna Jain, Dr. Punita Saxena and Ms. Heena Lamba has been awarded the certificate of MOST SIGNIFICANT SOCIETAL IMPACT in research display at the convocation ceremony of Delhi University held on 19th November 2016.

Growing hearts IN LABS

The dream to figure out a way to grow whole, beating hearts from a patient's own cells began when the researchers saw that about only about a half of the population waiting for a transplant were able to receive it and even among them, however, many of the patients' body will attack the foreign cells within them and reject the transplant. And this dream almost through 2016 came in in Massachusetts General Hospital and School where Harvard Medical scientists got the closest we have ever come to achieve that goal.

Now here is how it has been done. After collecting 73 donor hearts that had been deemed unfit for transplantation, the scientists used detergent solution to wash away almost

On 12-13 January 2017, 2-Day National Workshop was held on Drug Discovery Technology - Computational Approaches in Drug Discovery and Design, which was conducted by the Department of Biomedical Sciences, SRCASW in collaboration with BioDiscovery Group, India.


The workshop was aimed to provide a set of stimulating lectures and group work sessions using latest and advanced modeling techniques of relevance to chemists, life scientists and modelers working in drug discovery. Participants should return to their labs with new ideas, best practices and software experiences to maximize productivity in their own drug discovery research activities in future. Two day talk was done by Founder and CEO of Biodiscovery group (India), Mr. Asif Naqvi.

all of the heart's cells. What was left with was a milky white, heart shaped scaffold of protein called as the extracellular matrix. They then used messenger RNA to reprogram human skin cells to become pluripotent cells which is a kind of master cell which can be turned into any cell in the body, which they turned into heart cells. The scientists then added these cells to the left ventricular wall of each heart matrix, and then mounted the hearts in a specially developed bioreactor that mimicked the conditions of the human body while feeding the cells a steady diet of nutrients. After two weeks it was seen that the new tissue looked just like that of the immature human heart and when given a jolt of electricity it started beating.

Though heart tissue has been grown in lab before, this was the first time heart tissue was regenerated from pluripotent stem cells in an extracellular matrix. This paved a new path towards solving the problem wherein a patient accepting a donor heart risked transplant rejection. Doctors can now grow the patient a new heart from his or her own cells and greatly cut down the chances of the rejection risk.
